Suggested guiding principles for CS engagement: DO YOU AGREE? WHAT'S MISSING?

- Broad representation of CS with experience working on all health-related MDGs and health systems strengthening
- Equal partner status alongside other members of the country team, including government representatives and donors (i.e. bilateral, multilaterals, Foundations), which requires:
 - Official recognition of the CS representatives by all country team partners
 - Full transparency of information and documents
 - Inclusion of CS representatives at all country team meetings and regional meetings of country teams
 - Equal voice in decision making process
- CS representatives to be selected through an open and transparent process managed by CS itself. To achieve this CS can draw on experience gained in selecting representatives for a number of existing international health initiatives including the Global Fund and UNITAID
- Allocation of sufficient time for CS reps to get feedback from the broader community on discussions, documents and information to feedback to decision-making
- Financial and technical support to CS representatives to attend meetings and for communications (including computer/internet resources) necessary to enable CS representatives to disseminate information to the wider CS community and to collect feedback for input into IHP+ decision-making
